

LIGHT A CANDLE, UGANDA



\$25 can provide:

- › A nutritious meal and the gospel to eight children.
- › Daily lunch for three children for one month at the Kibibi School.
- › Daily lunch for six children for one month at the Kizito School.
- › One month of weekly meals for 21 children in the Katanga slum.

\$50 can provide:

- › Daily lunch for six children for one month at the Kibibi School.
- › Sanitary napkins for 40 girls which are essential for them to stay in school.
- › Daily lunch for 13 children for one month at the Kizito School.
- › One month of weekly meals for 43 children in the Katanga slum.

\$75 can provide:

- › Safe drinking water to a family in our program.
- › One month of education fees and supplies for one child.

\$100 can provide:

- › a nutritious meal and the gospel to 32 children.
- › Sanitary napkins for 80 girls which are essential for them to stay in school.
- › Daily lunch for 12 children for one month at the Kibibi School.
- › Daily lunch for 26 children for one month at the Kizito School.
- › One month of weekly meals for 87 children in the Katanga slum.
- › Monthly salary for the cook at the Katanga slum.

\$120 can provide:

- › Spiritual discipleship materials for the children served monthly

- › Two months of education fees and supplies for one child.

\$230 can provide:

- › Monthly assistance for a Specially Made children's home.

- › Access to safe drinking water for four families in one of our programs.
- › Monthly meals for 27 children at the Kibibi School.
- › Daily lunch for 65 children for one month at the Kizito School.

Bringing hope and love to vulnerable children and their families living in extreme poverty in the slums of Uganda.

WHY KAMPALA

Kampala is home to 3.5 million people, with 57 slums where the most vulnerable live. In these slums, half of the population is made up of children under the age of 15. Life here is marked by extreme poverty, poor sanitation, and daily exposure to crime.

For many families, survival means scavenging through trash for something to sell in hopes of buying food. Drug use and prostitution are common, and law enforcement is scarce. The impact of the HIV/AIDS epidemic has left many children with only one parent—or none at all. With no access to school, these children are often left alone, facing high risks of abuse, assault, and exploitation.

Our program serves over 600 children in some of the most difficult areas of Kampala. Meals are prepared and served directly in the communities and schools we support. Children also receive education, mentoring, and discipleship, while women benefit from our micro-financing program, which helps them establish their own small businesses to support their families.

Light a Candle Uganda has acquired land for an agricultural initiative and for the construction of a centralized community center aimed at better serving the children and families. The future looks promising as our program continues to grow, expand, and bring glory to God!
